



e were introduced to our Pennycuick ancestors at quite an early stage. Netta when just a young teenager was given the job of copying out family pedigrees on to long sheets of wall-paper. One of theese pedigrees was of the Pennycuick family, of which our mother's mother was one. The Pennycuick's according to the National Gazetter, of 1868, established Pennycuick, a parish near Linton and ten miles south of Edinburgh. The village was anciently known as Pen-y-coc, signafying 'The Cookoos Hill' stands on the river North Esk.

Pennycuick's house is described as a mansion with a Grecian portico of eight columns built in 1761.

The motto is 'That I might rise again'.

Our archive shows us that our great, great, great grandfather was John Pennycuick. He died in 1830. His son Brig. General Lt. Col. John Pennycuick CB. KH. was born in 1789. He married Sarah Farrell from Ireland in 1805 and died tragically with his son Alexander in the Battle of Chillienwallah, the Punjab in 1849. John and Sarah had eleven children, including the youngest, our mother's grandfather, Charles Edward Ducat Pennycuick, Treasurer of Ceylon. He died in 1903. Charles married Clementina Woodhead and had two children born in Ceylon, Agnes Helen (our grandmother) and James.



CHARLES EDWARD DUCAT PENNYCUICK, ESQUIRE, C.M.G.



We knew that two of our ancestors had died in this battle and that a seventeen year old boy had fought to the death to save his fathers body from being mutilated. This battle was the final act for Lt. Col John Pennycuick, our mother's great grandfather, after an illustrious career in the British army. His son who died at the battle, was Alexander.

He kept a diary, of which we have a copy, which details his time in India, Java, Bengal, Burma, Afghanistan etc.

While stationed in Ireland, in Tullamore, Mullingar and Castlebar, he met and married Sarah Farrell, then aged fifteen, in 1820. They had eleven children. In his diaries there are references, among all the details of his life in the various countries he was


